IMPACT OF ACA FUNDING to WEST VIRGINIA

A full repeal of the ACA would result in a devastating **\$1 billion loss** of federal healthcare funding to West Virginia:

- Up to 800,000 West Virginians 52% of non-elderly West Virginians have a pre-existing condition such as diabetes, asthma, pregnancy, substance use disorder, black lung and many other common conditions. More West Virginians under the age of 65 have a pre-existing condition than in any other state in the union.
- In West Virginia, approximately 150,000 low-income people gained coverage under the Medicaid expansion. In West Virginia, Medicaid covers 1 in 4 adults and 1 in 2 children.
- The ACA expanded Medicaid to cover behavioral health services or substance abuse disorder treatment.
 In 2019, 30,000 Medicaid members in West Virginia were diagnosed with an opioid use diagnosis. As ground zero for the opioid epidemic, improving access to treatment is vital to our families and communities.
- The loss of federal ACA dollars impacts state jobs as well. An estimated 16,000 jobs in West Virginia would be lost with a full repeal. Medicaid expansion alone resulted in 6,200 new jobs in West Virginia.
- In West Virginia, **25% of the population access health care through a Community Health Center.** Through the ACA, these centers were able to expand services, including: primary and preventive care; school-based health services; behavioral health services; and substance-use disorder services.
